Class:	To come to class prepared, you must read the material in advance and be ready to ask any needed questions. This class consists of discussions and broad thinking. The point of this class is to learn ideas and logical concepts. This is not a traditional math course that deals only with calculations. Success will come for students who are determined and ready to learn every day.			
Exams:	There will be three exams that are each 25% of your final grade. Tentative dates for the exams are 9/28, 11/2, and the final on 12/16. A tentative class calendar is posted on the website.			
	There will be homework problems assigned from each section. These problems will be listed on the website. Some problems will be collected during the semester for a grade. However, you will need to keep up with the assignments and see me during office hours if any questions arise. Quizzes will be worth 10 points each. Some quiz questions and test questions will come directly from the homework, so keeping up with the homework will greatly help your grades.			
In-Class Questions:	During lectures I will often assign a short in-class assignment. These assignments consist of short written responses about the lecture. It will be graded with either a zero or a one; if you turn it in then you will get full credit. This is designed to give me instant feedback on your level of understanding of the day's concepts and encourage you to come to class. This will also include a department wide class assessment exercise to gauge the STA 200 classes. In-class questions will be 5% of your final grade. You may not make up any missed in-class assignments.			
Grading:	Each exam is worth 25% of your final grade, the quizzes and labs are worth 20%, and the inclass questions are worth 5%.

Make-Up Policy:	Make-up exams and quizzes will be given only for students missing class due to an illness or emergency. If for some reason, you must come to class late or leave early, please try to inform me in advance. Cell phones MUST BE TURNED OFF when you enter the classroom and must remain so until class is dismissed.		
Ethics:	Cheating <i>will not</i> be tolerated. At this point, you should know what constitutes cheating. If not, please check the University Bulletin. The minimum penalty for cheating is an automatic E which cannot be removed from your transcript. I do not want to deal with this so please make sure that this does not become an issue.		
Calculator:	I recommend that you have a calculator that does basic calculations including powers and square roots.		
Additional Information:	My office hours are the only times I guarantee that I will be in my office and available to answer questions. If these times do not fit your schedule, don't worry. You can talk to me before or after class or you can e-mail me to set up another time. E-mail is probably the best way to reach me.
